## OUR PRESIDENTS STATEMENT

In 2022, the Lacombe and District Historical Society emerged from the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic with notable success. Despite the impact felt over the previous two years, the Society made significant progress towards returning to normal operations.

One of the Society's most significant achievements this year was the acquisition and installation of new shelving at the Flatiron Building. Thanks to the remarkable grant-writing skills of Melissa and her team, the cost of the shelves was fully paid for. With the shelves now in place, a dedicated team of volunteers, led by the staff to successfully relocated over 8000 artefacts from the Michener House to the Flatiron Building before winter weather forced a temporary halt to the effort.

The Lacombe and District Historical Society was proud to be recognized as the recipient of the Non-Profit of the Year award in the 2022 Lacombe & District Chamber of Commerce Lacombe Ford Awards, which was an incredible honour for the Society.

Looking back on the year, we should all be impressed by our accomplishments. We hosted a variety of successful fundraising events throughout the spring and summer, including the Heritage Fashion Show, High Tea at the Michener House Museum & Gardens, the Blacksmith Hammer In Festival, and the inaugural Servus Credit Union Harvest Dinner.

The Board, staff, and volunteers also took part in numerous training and engagement opportunities with our community partners. These included:

# EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS STATEMENT

The Lacombe Museum is proud to continue our commitment to providing exceptional services and collaborative partnerships in the region. Our work is carried out on behalf of the Lacombe & District Historical Society, its Board of Directors, and members.

Over the past year, we hosted a monthly Speaker Series featuring a wide variety of specialists from local, regional, national, and international locations. Our Flatiron Building Museum showcased new several exhibits, programs, workshops, events and opportunities for artisans and Indigenous makers in the giftshop. The Blacksmith Shop Museum completed the 8-year wait for restorations on the Trip Hammers, held workshops, programs and hosted the largest Hammer-In Festival to date with 12 Blacksmiths from all over Western Canada and over 500 visitors. The Michener House Museum had siding repairs completed, hosted events, programs, tours, created the accessible raised garden beds in the Heritage Garden and faciliated weekly walking tours.

In the Collections, the new compact shelving has made a massive difference, allowing the Collections Move Plan to go ahead. We also arranged a successful transfer of Gilmour Family history records and items from the family in the USA.

We worked with community partners like the City's Heritage Resource Committee to host in-person historic window repair workshops. We increased our offering of services including mentorship, professional development and training opportunities, assistance with artifact care and digitization, research, exhibit development, event planning, grant writing, project proposals, & advisory assistance with heritage conservation of built heritage buildings.

Over 2022, our work in the community focused on four key-pillars:

access; inclusion; reconciliation; and engagement beyond our physical spaces to make us a more welcoming and available organization to all within our community.

To the Lacombe & District Historical Society, our volunteers, staff, members, and community, I would like to express my sincerest gratitude for your continued support and efforts to keep Lacombe's history alive and flourishing. With your help, I look forward to progressing the mission over the next year.
